PADTC is a private psychiatric day treatment center for youth 12 – 18 years of age.

PADTC's commitment to our students and meeting their needs in the fall led us to the following conclusions regarding our fall reopening plans:

- PADTC must keep equity at the forefront of all decisions as we continue to meet the needs of our students who have been historically marginalized over time.
- PADTC will provide a hybrid plan that allows students and families to attend limited in person, as well as a comprehensive distance learning plan for families who are uncomfortable returning to school.
- PADTC students need flexible systems of support that can accommodate different learning styles and mental health needs, as well as full implementation of IEP, 504, ELL and other support systems.
- PADTC will continue to concentrate on care and connection for our students including building deep relationships.
- Instill confidence within the PADTC community that we can provide a safe, healthy environment for those returning to school.
- PADTC will provide a predictable schedule for Comprehensive Distant Learning with limited in person instruction.
- Provide opportunity for students to receive their therapeutic services while attending PADTC.
- PADTC will embrace Comprehensive Distance Learning as educators and students as a reliable means of growth for students in an ever-changing environment.

PADTC will be evaluating metrics for Polk County regularly throughout the fall. PADTC will continue to offer CDL with limited in person instruction as the Statewide Exception for statewide allowance for limited-in person instruction.

**LIMITED IN-PERSON INSTRUCTION FOR SPECIFIC GROUPS OF STUDENTS**

As per ODE's Comprehensive Distance Learning guidance, providing limited in-person instruction to meet the needs of specific groups of students based on needed educational, relational, curricular, instructional, and/or assessment supports. This includes, but is not limited to, provisions for supporting students experiencing disability, English language learners, as well as programs such as career technical education (CTE) that may require hands-on demonstration of skills and the provision of secure assessment environments. ### CDL: Limited In-Person Instruction

#### Limited by Group Size with Stable Cohorts

Cohort groups are limited to no more than 10 students at a given time in a cohort. Students cannot be part of more than two cohorts (including transportation) in any given week. Any one staff member cannot interact with more than three cohorts in a given day and five in a week.

#### Limited by time in the building per student

The time a single student or student cohort of any size can spend in a school building on a given day is limited to two consecutive hours and cannot be intermittent.

#### Limited by Absolute Size

The absolute number of students who can come to a school building within a given week is limited to 250 students and is further guided by the facility occupation limits described below when child care is also being offered.



### CDL: Limited In-Person Instruction

#### Limited by guidance and legal protections

- Limited in-person instruction cannot replace the requirements of CDL for any learner. Districts under CDL must adhere to the requirements of CDL while bringing students on-site under exceptions.
- For students who experience disability, offers of FAPE cannot require students to come on-site during limited in-person instruction to satisfy requirements of SDI or related services. Students must continue to have full provisions of FAPE under CDL.
- For students who require language instruction, schools cannot require students to come on-site during limited in-person instruction as the sole means of providing instructional services under Title III.

Students learn at highest levels when access to general education peers and grade level content is sustained. Comprehensive Distance Learning allows for creative exploration around co-teaching, integrated services within the general education setting, and strategic balance of asynchronous and synchronous learning opportunities. While small group and individual instruction may be a necessary component of any student’s learning day, invest in as many opportunities for inclusionary practices as possible.</p> <p><b>Required</b>  The majority of each student’s services under ESSA, ADA, or IDEA must be provided synchronously (i.e., with the teacher/service provider and student working together through direct, simultaneous communication). The amount of instruction that is synchronous vs. asynchronous is determined locally by each school and district, but should overwhelmingly lean towards a synchronous nature. ## 2. Facilities and School Operations



Some activities and areas will have a higher risk for spread (e.g., band, choir, science labs, locker rooms). When engaging in these activities within the school setting, schools will need to consider additional physical distancing or conduct the activities outside (where feasible). Additionally, schools should consider sharing explicit risk statements for instructional and extra-curricular activities requiring additional considerations (see section 5f of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).

## 2a. ENROLLMENT
