Stagecraft is a technical theater course for students to experience a range of technical theater opportunities. It is an elective for students in 10th through 12th grades. **This is not a class recommended for students with dust or latex allergies due to the materials used in our content.**

Career Related Learning Standards: Career-related learning standards (CRLS) are fundamental skills essential for success in employment, college, family, and community life. We have integrated the Personal Management standard from the CRLS into all courses at DHS. **This standard will be assessed and communicated independent of the academic grade.** It is included below and mainly includes behaviors that will be assessed in this course.

Academic Integrity

Student Behavior and Expectations:

Clearly defined behavioral expectations are consistent school-wide through the Dragon **PRIDE** acronym. Student Electronic Devices at Dallas High School:

Students are allowed to possess personal electronic devices at school and at school-sponsored activities provided such devices are not used in any manner that may disrupt the learning environment, school-sponsored activities or violate Board policies, administrative regulations, school or classroom rules, or state and federal laws. Cell phone usage is **only** permitted during scheduled passing periods and lunch times. Students are not allowed to be on their phones in the hallways and other common areas during class time and cell phone usage in the bathrooms and locker rooms is prohibited **at all times**. Students must use a Chromebook or laptop to complete and submit coursework. Cell phones cannot be used for this purpose and can only be used during class time with express advance permission from the teacher.

Diversity

Tardies and Unexcused Absences/ Shop Hour Points: Points will be given towards the Personal Management grade at intervals for daily attendance and punctuality. These will appear in Canvas as “Shop Hours”. Points will be deducted for each tardy and each unexcused absence in that grading period. Overly disruptive behavior and lack of cleaning/putting away tools may also result in loss of these points.

Ways to succeed in Stagecraft:

1. Realize as quickly as possible that you will have to work. It's a different kind of work from what you're used to but it needs to be done well and done on time.
2. Be prepared to take risks. Going up in a Genie Lift can be scary. You can do it even if you don't go all the way up.
3. Work for the group. Support, Encourage and Accept. If this is difficult for you, get used to it. You will hear this over and over again.
4. Nobody is left behind. Having a bad day? Feeling embarrassed? Not prepared? As a class, we will support and wait for you.
5. You'll get dirty, dusty and be around paint. It's messy but fun so have a great time.

Here are the general rules

1. Please, no food, drinks, or gum in the theater.
2. Keep your feet off of the theater seats.
3. The light booth, sets, props, and my office are not a part of the classroom. Please stay out of them unless your assignment takes you there.
4. Be where you are supposed to be at all times. Never leave Bollman/Scene Shop without checking in with Crom or Miss Vette
5. You will need pen/pencil, paper, notes, and sometimes a script. Have them.
6. Keep your phones turned off.
7. **Students must dress in shoes with closed toes and have clothing available that can accommodate painting and construction activities on a daily basis. If you want to bring a change of shoes or clothes to leave here, we have a place to put them.**

Performance Work

Live tech time is required. This may involve set construction days on Saturday for the DHS plays or a tech running job for the play. Students who are already completing tech work as part of the after school program are not required to perform additional tech time. Set Construction dates will be announced in class. . Opportunities to Usher will be on November 9 after school, November 10 at 6:00, November 11 at 6:00 and November 12 at 1:00 and 6:00.

Play Attendance – Required (but free)!

You must go to see a **full length live performance in person.** Students can attend the final dress rehearsal at all high school plays and occasional student nights at Pentacle Theater for free.

Once you see your live performance you will write a critique of the show. Don't put them off. **This is the one written assignment that is not accepted late.** No exceptions for late play reports including being absent on that day. When you have weeks to do them, any mishap that happens to you is a risk you take when waiting until the last moment.

* Fall Term Due Date is the day prior to Christmas Break. (December 16)

* Spring Term Due date is the day prior to Memorial Day. (May 25)
