Course Description:

Advanced Theater is a course for students to sample a range of theater experiences emphasizing performance and student driven work. It is an elective for students in 10th through 12th grades and requires public performances. The course may be repeated as overall course goals do not change although the content used does change with each semester.

Academic Integrity

Student Electronic Devices at Dallas High School:

Students are allowed to possess personal electronic devices at school and at school-sponsored activities provided such devices are not used in any manner that may disrupt the learning environment, school-sponsored activities or violate Board policies, administrative regulations, school or classroom rules, or state and federal laws. Cell phone usage is **only** permitted during scheduled passing periods and lunch times. Students are not allowed to be on their phones in the hallways and other common areas during class time and cell phone usage in the bathrooms and locker rooms is prohibited **at all times**. Students must use a Chromebook or laptop to complete and submit coursework. Cell phones cannot be used for this purpose and can only be used during class time with express advance permission from the teacher.

Diversity

Gender

Tardies and Absences/ Rehearsal Points:

Points will be given towards the Personal Management grade at intervals for daily attendance and punctuality. These will appear on Home Access as "Rehearsal Points". Points will be deducted for each tardy and each unexcused absence in that grading period. Overly disruptive behavior and lack of materials may also result in loss of attendance points. Advanced students are required to use professional behavior in the event that they are absent. This involves pre-

arranging absences, emailing to Crom to alert the company of their absence prior to the start of the class period. This can be done at: Blair.Cromwell@dtd2.org.

Students whose attendance/tardies negatively impacts the work of the group will be removed from the project. Where it is possible, students may complete a similar project independently. An alternate project is not always possible. Better idea, come to class. You are needed here.

Ways to succeed in theater

1. Realize as quickly as possible that you will have to work. It's a different kind of work from what you're used to but it needs to be done well and done on time.
2. Be prepared to take risks. Theater asks you to go where you aren't always comfortable- be ready to accept the challenge and forgive yourself if you struggle.
3. Work for the group. Support, Encourage and Accept. If this is difficult for you, get used to it. You will hear this over and over again.
4. Nobody is left behind. Having a bad day? Feeling embarrassed? Not prepared? As a class, we will support and wait for you.

Here are the general rules

1. Please, no food, drinks, or gum in the theater. Advanced Theatre - this means no coffee in the wings in the morning.
2. Keep your feet off of the theater seats.
3. Be where you are supposed to be at all times. You should never leave the theatre without checking in with me and fill out a hall pass. .
4. You will need a chromebook, pen/pencil, paper, notes, and often a script.
5. Be a responsible theatre artist by not having your phone be present in rehearsal, in class, etc.

Performance Work

Everyone performs on time, even students who are unprepared, have lost their voice, are not memorized....etc.

Play Report – Required (but free)!

Advanced Theatre students must **go see a full length live performance in person.** Students can attend the final dress rehearsal at all high school plays and occasional student nights at Pentacle Theater, LaCreole, and Central High School for free. Other plays are available but will involve a ticket cost.

Once you see your live performance you will write a critique of the show. Don't put them off. **This is the one written assignment that is not accepted late.** No exceptions for late play reports including being absent on that day. When you have months to do them, any mishap that happens to you is a risk you take when waiting until the last moment.
